

Dear Incoming 4th and 5th Graders,

I'm so excited to be your teacher next year! This letter explains the summer work you have for this coming summer. The basic idea is to read, read and read some more:) And then for math, we will be using the diagnostic math website IXL. Below is the general breakdown. Then continue reading for more details.

Math:

- Multiplication fact practice
- IXL: Summer Boost Program (and suggested skills for returning 5th grade students)
- Optional: IXL bingo card

Reading:

- Read at least 5 chapter books at your level
- Keep reading log of books completed
- Optional: reading bingo card

MATH SUMMER WORK

Below I have outlined the recommended math work for this summer. The goal of these activities is to have fun and review the concepts you learned in 3rd or 4th grade.

A goal is that you try to come into 4th grade with your multiplications facts (up to 12 x 12) memorized. It is a requirement for 5th graders. Nothing beats good ol' fashioned flashcards for quick recall. Similarly, there are tons of multiplication apps and games online to help you practice. I'd also like you to spend some time doing IXL to sharpen your math skills. IXL offers a special "Summer Boost Skill Plan". In it you'll find a 4-week plan to practice skills each weekday. The schedule is for 20 days, so it is up to you how you would like to plan out your summer work. You can stretch it out throughout the summer, or wait til the last month before school starts. Please plan a schedule with your parents on how will you complete this work, depending on your summer plans, travel and activities. Additionally, returning 5th grade students should work on their "recommended skills" in IXL as discussed in class.

SUMMER READING 2024

Now onto READING! Summertime is a wonderful time for relaxing, exploring and reading. I'd like all incoming 4th and 5th graders to continue their practice of reading throughout the summer. Not only will this give you a pleasurable pastime, it will also keep your reading skills sharp. Please try to develop an easy summer reading program. It could be as simple as a quiet time set aside most days of the week for reading.

Each student should read at least 5 chapter books this summer. At the end of this letter you will find links to book lists that can be used for ideas and guidance. Students should keep track of the books that they read on the attached Book Log. This sheet should be turned in to me when school starts in the fall. Students should be prepared to discuss/write about two chosen summer reading books on the first day of school.

I ask that you NOT read any of the following titles, as they may be part of our coursework throughout the year:

- By the Great Horn Spoon
- Home of the Brave
- Wild Robot

- Island of the Blue Dolphins
- Esperanza Rising

To bring some fun and variety to the summer reading, there is a bingo card at the end of this letter that you should consider trying out. The card is to challenge you to read in different places as well as different types of books. The goal is to hit as many bingo spaces as possible, and also to have fun and try something unique. Simply mark off the spaces as you complete them, have a parent sign them, then bring the card to school on the first day.
